The native New Yorker, presently living in Berlin and Paris with his girlfriend Ute Lemper, presents in his new solo program "The Man With Three Balls" the pleasant understatement of a wizzard, a persiflage of show business, German and Jewish culture, German and Jewish stupidities and American paranoia, all of this following the motto: Black humor means laughing in the face of everything. Tabatsky's juggling numbers go a little short, of course, the man is just too busy straightening out his thoughts. At the end, though, he gets rid of his headache and his audience in the Scheinbar Variete have learned the lesson that even with three balls life is just as hard. We take it easy, though. Confetti. Exit. Exultation.
